

 Display the presentation on your projector so all students can read the questions. If this isn't a possibility you could always just read the questions to them or print this off and give the group a question each time it was / their turn.




2. Print (found in separate file) or write the possible \ prizes or dollar amounts so students can see.

instructions for teachers: DONE FOR YOU OPTION

- 1. Print the page that has all the dollar amounts or class prizes.
- 2. Make sure you have the same number of prizes or dollar amount prizes. If you have more or less question amounts than prize or dollar amounts, delete some of the options in the editable file.
 - For example, this presentation has 50+ questions, but I have included 40 prize options and dollar amounts in the editable file, so you will want to skip some questions or just go until your run out of briefcases.





instructions for teachers: CREATE YOUR OWN PRIZES

- 1. You will need as many prize options as you have questions/slides: Create prizes or amounts for each question and write them or type them on something that students can see during the game.
- 2. You can use my editable file or write your options on the board.
- 3. **Make sure you have the same number of prizes or dollar amount prizes.** If you have more or less question amounts than prize or dollar amounts, delete some of the options in the editable file.
 - For example, if a presentation has 20 questions, then you will need 20 prizes and 20 briefcases.

PLAYING THE GAME

- 1. At the beginning of the game divide your students into groups. Groups of 4 have worked best for our classroom.
- 2. After students are in their groups have them decide on the number of the "briefcase" they think has the biggest prize (or prize they want). When they have decided on their "briefcase" (as a team) allow them to select their "briefcase."
 - If your envelopes or briefcases are see-through, you could just keep the envelopes at the front until the end of the game.
- 3. Once students have selected a "briefcase" you can begin playing the game.
- 4. Have groups start answering questions from the presentation. Each time a team answers a question correctly they can eliminate one of the other "briefcases" that none of the groups have selected or they can switch their "briefcase" with one at the front of the room. You would then open their "briefcase" and eliminate that amount. From the board.
- 5. Each time students eliminate a reward, cross it off the board so students can see what prizes may still be left in their selected "briefcases."
- 6. One option is to leave 1 to 3 unopened 'briefcases" until the end, so students have the option to switch out their "briefcase" or eliminate it.
- 7. After all questions have been answered and/or when you have run out of "briefcases" each group can open their "briefcase" to see what prize they have gotten.

examples from my classroom




I have a classroom economy with paychecks, so I just use dollar amounts.

I write all the amounts on the white board and erase as we eliminate envelopes.

I have two of the same because I had two different classes when we played this game.

I just project the game on my whiteboard and have students answer the students as a group. I have 4-5 groups each time, and at the end, each groups has an envelope.

That means we don't eliminate 4-5 envelopes because that's the prize for each team.





I use actual envelopes and just write the amounts on sticky notes that go inside.

When we open that amount, we eliminate the amount on the whiteboard.
