

USING DIALOGUE IN NARRATIVE WRIT

DIALOGUE RULE #1

You must start a new paragraph and indent each time new person talks.

DIALOGUE RULE #2

Quotation marks only go around the words a character actually says.

DIALOGUE RULE #3

Always capitalize the first word inside a quotation.

DIALOGUE RULE #4

Punctuation goes inside the quotation marks.

DIALOGUE RULE #5

When there are quotation marks, you most likely nee a comma somewhere. Either at the end of the word quotations or before when the speaker is being introduced: He said, ... '

Dialogue should serve the following purposes in a narrative essay: Give readers a better understanding of characters.

Give readers a better understanding of the setting. It should move the story along, not slow it down.

WHERE: Start your narrative by describing a setting

ACTION: Start your narrative by jumping right into the action






1	What Is a Narrative? Students are introduced to personal narratives. They learn the six key elements of narrative writing and set up their interactive notebooks.
2	Narrative Elements in Mentor Texts: Using mentor texts, students identify elements like setting, point of view, and dialogue, and analyze how authors build strong narratives.
3	Brainstorming Personal Narrative Ideas: Students generate multiple story ideas through prompts and task cards/slides, collecting as many possibilities as possible.
4	Picking an Idea & Zooming In: Students choose one story idea and zoom in on a specific moment, using sensory details and focusing on a single important event.
5	Narrative Plot Diagrams: Students map their chosen story using a plot diagram (exposition, rising action, climax, falling action, resolution).
6	Point of View: Students study and practice writing from a first-person point of view to strengthen their personal narratives.
7	Using Sensory Details: Students learn how to use the five senses to create vivid scenes and make their writing come alive.

15	Editing vs. Revising: Students learn the difference between revising content (ideas, organization, detail) and editing for grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
16	Final Drafts: Students publish their narratives, focusing on neatness, correctness, and showing their best effort in a polished final piece.


EXAMPLE OF LESSON TEN'S SLIDES
